Mid-week our incredible staff showed off their acting skills and performed an outdoor road safety play. The children were very interactive, ensuring that our staff had top tips about how to stay safe on the roads. This was followed by a road safety sign scavenger hunt.

The fabulous finale was our bus practice. Stagecoach and Bennetts gifted us some of their time so that pupils could practice reading a bus timetable, boarding a bus, buying a ticket and having a safe journey on the bus. The children loved it, but also learnt some very valuable life skills that will help them build their independence in the future. Free online training for parents

Many parents at school approach us for support when struggling to manage behaviour at home. This might take the form of violence, control, or self-destructive behaviour, and parents can be assured that they are not alone. To try to help, Belmont has commissioned some training in Non-Violent Resistance (NVR). NVR has been implemented in a wide range of family situations including violence, verbal abuse, self-harm and when children are distressed and dysregulated. NVR can be used with children from around 5 years old, right up to adulthood. It has proved effective with neuro-atypical children/young people and with all kinds of family make-up, including foster and adoptive families.

The session will be run online, and it is looking like the most popular session is going to be Tuesday 25th April in the afternoon. Usually there is a cost involved for participants but we are pleased that this will be completely free for our families

ALLIGATORS CLASS

Exploring the extraordinary world of toys

We have been busy as ever in Alligators and the children have all had a lovely term. Focusing on our topic The Magic Toy Box has allowed the children to engage really well in imaginative and exploratory play. Art has allowed us to continue our exploration of a variety of media which has led to some great individual pieces of expressive work. We have been able to observe the changing seasons in outdoor education and investigate how things grow.

We have been very creative and used our outdoor learning to make our own mythical creatures in lots of different ways - drawing in response to music, chalk drawings on the playground, making a 3D Loch Ness monster using tyres, painting, and making models using playdough!

We have been busy in maths learning about money and were lucky to use our money to buy a ticket for a real life bus journey at school during road safety week. We have also had fun celebrating World Book Day, Red Nose Day, Mental Health Week and performing our springtime poem in our Easter assembly.







FOXES CLASS

Discovering the facts behind the 'unsinkable' ship

The end of the fourth term already! It's been busy and full of fun.

We have been finding out about the Titanic, and discovering lots of interesting facts about what happened to the ship that should have been unsinkable.

The children have been exploring different types of poetry and writing some of their own. In the Easter assembly they shared some of the poems they wrote about the Titanic using the structure of the book Polar Bear, Polar Bear to present their work in a similar way.







In Maths we have been learning about capacity and weight, looking at whether a container is full, half full, or empty and looking at whether something is heavy or light or the same weight. We have explored different weights from 1g to 1kg and compared which would be best to weigh different things.







We also had great fun dressing up and sharing our favourite stories for World Book Day, and even had a visit from a huge dinosaur!



GIRAFFES CLASS

A celebration of stories, careers and cheese scones

Although it has been a short term we have packed a lot into our time. We enjoyed celebrating the wonderful world of stories by dressing up as a character, using origami to make a book mark and spending time telling and reading stories to each other.

It was Careers Week! Throughout the week, the children were thinking about their future and what they would like to do when they leave school. The children were reflecting on the skills they already have and also thinking about ways to develop other skills that they might need for the future. As part of Careers Week, we attended a Careers Fair. It was very exciting to see all the different stands and the children got to speak to lots of different people about different opportunities for when they leave Belmont.

We've been baking again! Cheese scones were great fun to make and we also made vanilla cupcakes. Both recipes required the children to cream the ingredients together... by week two the children were impressing us with their smooth mixtures. It was particularly great to see classmates helping each other and giving tips on the technique.

We have also been having fun during morning Sensory Circuits, getting on a bus as part of Road Safety Week, and measuring giant foot prints in maths.













HIPPOS CLASS

An eruption of creativity

This term the Hippo Class has been getting creative! We have been making moving pictures including a fire truck and train that fly across paper scenes.

We have also been making and decorating volcanos for our explosive science experiment.




IBEXES CLASS

a trip to the fun fair to look forward to. We are now all ready to unwind over the Easter holidays ready for the summer terms ahead of us.




NIGHTOWLS CLASS
